

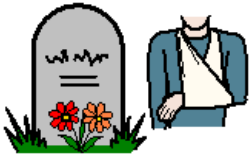
# Incident in Manchester



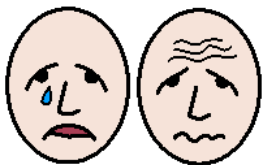
On Monday 22nd May there was a **serious incident**.



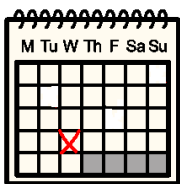
It happened in **Manchester** at a music concert.



Some people have died. Others have been injured.



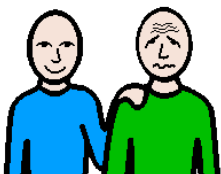
When things like this happen it is normal to feel **upset** and **worried**.
